10 Tips for Avoiding Common Mistakes Made with Electricity

Lectricity is an integral, yet easily overlooked, part of our everyday lives. The Safe Electricity program encourages everyone to brush up on guidelines for using electricity safely and offers these 10 tips on how to safely avoid common mistakes made with electricity:

- 1. Just because a power line is down does not mean it is dead. Whether caused by a storm or a car accident, a fallen power line is very dangerous. Stay far away, instruct others to stay away, and call your electric utility immediately.
- 2. Never plug a generator into a wall outlet. After a power outage, many use generators as a quick solution to get the lights back on, but plugging a generator into an outlet creates dangerous backfeed. Backfeed sends electricity back through the power lines and can injure or kill the lineman trying to turn the power back on.
- 3. Don't step into a flooded basement if there is a chance that flood waters may be in contact with outlets or electrical cords. The waters of a flooded basement may be energized with electricity.
- 4. Water and electrical equipment don't mix. Replace any appliance damaged by water because it is unsafe to use, and never use electrical equipment in wet conditions if it is raining or the ground is wet.
- 5. All outlets near areas with water should have GFCI protection. Ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) monitor the flow of electricity in a circuit. If there is an irregularity of electrical flow, the power is cut off, preventing an electric shock.
- 6. Extension cords should never be used permanently. Extension cords are created for temporary use only. When using them for a permanent solution, they can overheat and cause fires.
- 7. Never remove a plug's grounding pin. The third prong on a plug is a safety feature. If the plug doesn't fit, the outlet needs replaced.
- 8. Take care of electrical cords. Never tack or nail an electrical cord to any surface or run cords across traffic paths or under rugs where they can be trampled, and check cords occasionally for damage. Replace when necessary.
- Avoid overloading outlets. Plugging in too many appliances to an outlet can strain your electrical system.
- 10. Always call 811 before any digging project. You don't know the precise location of utilities that are buried beneath the ground, so always 3086302 have your utilities marked so you know where it is safe to dig.

Watt's Cooking?

1 (12.8 oz) box Rice Chex

1 ½ cup semi-sweet chocolate chip

¾ cup peanut butter

½ cup unsalted butter

1 ¼ teaspoon vanilla extract

4 ½ - 5 cups powdered sugar

- Start by taking the whole box of Chex cereal and place it into a very large bowl. Set this aside.
- Place chocolate chips, peanut butter, and butter in a large microwave safe bowl. Microwave for 60 seconds and then stir
 until smooth. If the chocolate chips haven't melted enough, microwave at 30 second intervals, stirring in between, until
 the mixture is completely melted. Then stir in vanilla extract.
- Pour the chocolate mixture over the Chex cereal and stir together gently with a spatula.
- Do not overmix. The cereal pieces should be completely coated in chocolate, but it's ok for a few to clump together.
- Next, pour in the powdered sugar. Mix and pour more powdered sugar in if needed. The Chex should be completely white.
- Store in an airtight container.

HOW TO CLEAN REFRIGERATOR COILS

... AND WHY IT MATTERS!

Your refrigerator is one of the largest, most-used appliances in your home. It requires only minimal maintenance – just simple cleaning of the condenser coils, which disperse heat. If the coils are covered with dust, gunk or pet hair, they cannot diffuse the heat properly and will not run efficiently. A bigger problem can result if the compressor burns out from having to run constantly because of the grimy coating. This can be an expensive problem. The bottom line? A minor investment in time once a year can save you cold cash down the line.



MATERIALS YOU WILL NEED

- Vacuum cleaner with hose Damp cloth
- Locate the refrigerator's coil, a grid-like structure, or fan that will likely have a covering or grate protecting it. The coil is usually concealed behind the front toe kick or in the back. Some newer models have internal coils, so if you don't find them in the front or back, this may be the case with your fridge.
- 2. If the coil is in the back, slide the refrigerator away from the wall, removing the plug from the electrical outlet when possible. You may also need to disconnect the line to the water dispenser or icemaker to allow enough room to work.
- Gently vacuum and clean the coil. Using the brush or crevice attachment, carefully vacuum the dust and dirt wherever you see it. If you have pulled the fridge out, vacuum and wipe down the sides and back of the fridge and the floor.
- 4. Once the floor is dry, plug in the refrigerator and rearrange the power cord and supply lines so they don't get a kink or stuck under the weight of the refrigerator. Slide the refrigerator back into place. Be sure to replace the toe kick panel if this was removed.
